# Sayre Junior High to Get First School Pool in City

The Board of Education is taking a plunge into the swimming pool business.

It announced today that it will build its first swimming pool adjoining the Sayre Junior High School, 58<sup>th</sup> and Walnut sts., in cooperation with the city Department of Recreation.

Michael P. Marcase, director of school planning, said the pool at Sayre will be 75 feet long by 42 feet wide.

Shallow at both ends, the pool will be designed primarily for swimming instruction, Marcase said, but will also be divided into seven lanes for competition.

A separate diving pool will complete the \$800,000 project.

Marcase said the project will be the first in creating a network of schools with pools.

The proposed University City High School, at 36<sup>th</sup> st. and Lancaster av., a replacement for the William Penn High School, 15<sup>th</sup> and Mt. Vernon sts., and the proposed middle school at Wayne and Chelten avs., are already slated for pools, Marcase said.

The city will contribute \$275,000 towards the design and construction of the Sayre pool, which will be available for use after school and during summers.

In a statement, Richardson Dilworth, school board president, said:

“The city has long needed a year-round swimming program on a substantially larger basis than now exists, although we do have under the auspices of the recreation department a very good summer program and a number of private agencies do their utmost to fill the gap during winter months.
