City Gets \$60,000 to Aid Ill Among Relocated Poor

The Philadelphia Redevelopment Authority has been granted \$60,000 in federal funds to insure that public health services are provided to poor people uprooted by development projects.

The funds will be used to hire a staff of eight, and a parttime [sic] physician, to deal with some 500 families to be relocated from University City Unit 3, bounded roughly by Powelton and Lancaster avs., Chestnut, 34th and 40th sts. The area is to be used by University City Science Center, Presbyterian-University of Pennsylvania Medical Center and a new public high school.

Miss Louise E. Gardner, deputy director of the authority's relocation bureau, said the bureau has run into many health problems among the dislocated poor.

Certain areas have a high incidence of tuberculosis, she said, serious skin disorders and the problem of malnutrition.

Four "health helpers," two health counselors, a supervisor, secretary and part time physician will be hired with the funds.

Among their duties will be providing "escort service" to see that the poor get to public health clinics and their cases followed up as long as necessary.

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
