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Penn Group Asks More Low-Cost Housing

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A commission established by the University of Pennsylvania last night recommended the construction of 400 more low-cost housing units in Redevelopment Area 3 than are called for in present-plans.

Right now, 185 units to house about 550 people are slated for construction in the area bounded by Powelton av. and Chestnut st. and 34th and 40th sts.

But the Quadripartite Commission, established by Penn in the aftermath of the student sit-in on the campus last February, asked the university's trustees to approve the additional units. They would be built on five parcels of land totaling 11.7 acres surrounding the University City High School now being built on 37th st. just north of Market st.

The commission, established by Penn to safeguard the interests of West Philadelphia residents whose homes are threatened by institutional expansion, is composed of five local community leaders, headed by Herman Wrice, executive director of the Young Great Society; five administrators and trustees of the school, five students and five faculty members.

If the Penn trustees approve the plan, the trustees of the University-Presbyterian Medical Center and the University City Science Center, in addition to the Board of Education, will also have to agree.

If all four approve the plan, the successive consent of the Redevelopment Authority, the City Planning Commission, the City Council and the federal Department of Housing and Urban Development will have...

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
